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

"Ghost on Mount Cristo Rey" Exhibition.

Upon reaching the top of the Cerro de los Muleros where his friend was sculpting a 29 foot monument, Tom Lea and his wife, Sarah, were startled by a white spectre covered in limestone dust. This exhibition, in partnership with the Centennial Museum, reveals the history of Urbici Soler's *Risen Christ* at the summit of what is today called Mount Cristo Rey. It also probes the friendship of Lea and Soler, an immigrant sculptor from Barcelona.

Secrets Behind the Making of the Equestrian Monument. Riders Across the Centuries: Horsemen of the Spanish Borderlands. Claudia Rivers, Director of UTEP's Special Collections, will take participants through the library's collection of Jose Cisneros' work, commissioned in the 1980s when the new library was built. When Cisneros first showed his drawings to Tom Lea in 1938, Lea wrote a note to the city librarian, Maud Durlin Sullivan, saying "this guy has some stuff!" By the time Jose Cisneros died at age 99, he'd been honored by the King of Spain, governors, literary societies and President George W. Bush, who presented him with the National Humanities Medal in 2001.


The Hands of Cantú Presentation & Dramatic Reading. The El Paso Museum of Art is one of the largest repositories of Tom Lea paintings, including the complete set of ink wash illustrations for *The Hands of Cantú*. A gift from Mary Lewis Kleberg of the King Ranch, they help tell the story of orphaned Toribio as he is mentored by Don Vito Cantú, a breeder of the finest horses in New Spain. Toribio advances from roping cows to putting "a great horse through every elegant variation of movement, using a single finger of the left hand on the reins." When someone rustles the horses in exchange for Indian concubines and gold, there's adventure in regaining them. This presentation explores the novel's themes followed by a dramatic reading by Eden Performing Arts, a viewing of the original illustrations, and reception with Spanish music.

Horsehair Pottery Lesson. After returning to the Southwest from Chicago, Tom Lea worked for Dr. H.P. Mera in a WPA-supported job illustrating Pueblo "Rain Bird" designs at the Laboratory of Anthropology in Santa Fe. The experience recalled childhood memories of his father's *Casas Grandes* pottery collection. After a presentation on indigenous pottery, soldiers and their families will learn how to create horsehair pottery, witnessing how strands from a horse's mane and tail make lines on a pot.
